A LETTER TO THE LEADER

With over 13 million copies in print in over 38 languages, many are familiar with Dr. Gary Chapman's "5 Love Languages," which suggests that the ways we express and receive love can differ from person to person. Some feel most loved when someone gives them a hug (their love language is Physical Touch.) Others experience love when someone says they are proud of them (their love language is Words of Affirmation.) My dominant love language is Acts of Service; I dote on those whom I love and feel the most loved when those around me serve me. (My husband has learned this and will often do the dishes for me - and my heart responds.) On the opposite end of the spectrum for me is gift giving. It makes me positively uncomfortable to give and receive a gift. It is perhaps because of this that I sometimes wrestle with the concept of grace being a gift.

But a gift it is, and one that we must receive if we are to receive salvation. Grace can be a difficult concept for teens and adults alike to comprehend. It is something that we are freely given, yet do not deserve. In our world of capitalism, of having to work for what we earn, our cultural reality can make this even more difficult to understand and thus to receive. We understand the "wages of sin" more readily than the "gift of God." What's more, we live in a world where there are consequences for our actions, and girls will be used to this reality.

Romans 6:23 reminds us that "the wages of sin is death." We are all sinners, and thus we are all deserving of death, and no acts of service can change this reality. Thankfully this is not the end of the verse. It goes on to say, "but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." That "but" is perhaps the most important word in the Bible. That "but" is where we find amazing grace. Sin and death are not the end of the story; life through Jesus Christ is, and it's a happy ending indeed.

And this grace is a gift. A gift of incredible love. Regardless of what your love language is, we all need to be willing to accept the gift of salvation by trusting Jesus with our very lives. It is through receiving Jesus' gift, and in doing so believing in him and trusting him, that we receive that which we do not deserve – pardon for sin, peace of heart, and abundant life. So reach out and accept the gift of grace, and then encourage the girls to do the same.

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Create Energy

Make an easy beaded cross that the girls could wear as a pendant, keychain or bag embellishment. Instructions are taken from www.cutoutandkeep.net.

BEADED CROSS

WHAT YOU NEED:

- 2 feet of jewelry wire (24-30 gauge is best) OR beading thread per girl
- 10 large and 40 small beads per girl
- Wire cutters or scissors

WHAT TO DO:

- 1. Slide three small beads, one large bead, and three small beads onto the center of your wire
- 2. Slide another large bead on one side. Slide both wires through it and center above the first large bead.
- 3. Slide three small beads on both sides and a large bead on one side. Slide both ends through the large bead and center it above the others.
- 4. Repeat step 3.
- 5. On one side, slide on a small bead, a large bead, three small beads and one large bead.
- 6. Bring the end of the wire down, around and back through the first large bead.
- 7. Tighten the beads.
- 8. Repeat steps 5-7 for the other side.
- 9. Add an small bead to each side and a large bead on one side. Slide the other wire through the large bead.
- 10. Add three small beads to each side, a large bead to one side, and slide the other wire through the large bead.
- 11. Finish the cross by twisting the wires together and making a loop with the remaining wire. You may wish to add a chain or keychain ring at this time.



Get Hands On

PASS THE PARCEL

WHAT YOU NEED:

Newsprint or wrapping paper

Tape

• A shareable prize (like a large bag of mini candies)

• A label that says "Grace"

Music

BEFORE YOU BEGIN:

 Prepare your parcel. First, place the label "Grace" on the prize. Next, wrap your prize over, and over, and over again in layers of newsprint or wrapping paper. You want to aim for at least one layer per girl.



WHAT TO DO:


- Have girls sit in a circle. When the music starts playing, have the girls pass the parcel from one girl to another in a clockwise direction. When the music stops, the girl holding the parcel will unwrap one layer of wrapping paper.
- Play the game until the prize in the middle is found. Share the prize amongst the girls.
- Ask What is grace? (Receiving a blessing or gift we did not deserve; God's grace is God giving us what we don't deserve.) Why do you think the word "grace" is on the prize?
- Read Ephesians 2:8 together. Ask Does this helps us understand why the word "grace" is on the prize? (Grace is a gift from God.)
- *Share* We would not have received the candy prize if we did not choose to receive and open the gift. It is the same with grace.

God's Word

MISSING THE MARK

WHAT YOU NEED:

- NERF blaster(s) with NERF darts
- A frisbee (or two or three)
- A beach ball or balloon
- Poster board with a target drawn on it.
- Bibles, or pre-printed Bible verses.



WHAT TO DO:

• Play the following NERF challenges:

SAUCER INVASION

- Have one girl toss a frisbee in the air. Another girl with the NERF blaster has to try to hit the frisbee with a dart before the frisbee hits the ground. If this is too easy, try having two (or three) girls each toss a frisbee in unison, and the girl with the NERF blaster has to try to hit all of the frisbees before they hit the ground.
- If space doesn't allow you to toss these high, head outside, or lightly toss the frisbees from a seated position.

THE DISTANCE

■ This can be done with a beach ball or balloon and works best if two or three people have blasters. Toss the ball or balloon in the air. The girls with the blasters shoot at the ball or balloon, using their darts to keep it in the air. You could have someone time how long the balloon stays in the air and rotate to see which group can keep it in the air the longest.

BULLSEYE

 Simple NERF dart target practice. Tack the poster board target to a wall and have girls try to hit a bullseye.

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• Have girls open their Bibles to Romans 3:23 (or have it printed for the girls.)



Discuss – Sin isn't a word we use much anymore. Does anyone know what it means? (Allow time for answers.) When Paul wrote this letter to the Roman Christians, the word he uses in Greek for "sin" means "to miss the mark."

Ask - Now, how many of you had a difficult time hitting the frisbee, or the balloon, or the target in our NERF challenges? (Hopefully everyone.) In real life, the idea is the same. Just like we all had a difficult time with at least one of the challenges, when we sin we are missing the mark/goal of what God has in mind for how we should live.

Ask - How does it feel to know that everyone has missed the mark in at least some area of their lives? Does it encourage or depress you that everyone sins? (It can be encouraging to know that even those who seem to be "really good" have sinned, it can be discouraging that everyone sins – why even try to do what's right if we are all going to fail?)

Ask - In what areas of your life have you felt like you needed to be perfect?

• Have girls turn in their Bibles to Romans 6:23 (or have it printed for the girls.)



Ask – What's the greatest gift you've ever received? Ever given?

Ask – Looking at Romans 6:23, why is it good that we don't get what we deserve for our sins? (What we deserve is death, and that isn't a good gift. You may want to describe here that death can be synonymous with eternal separation from God.)

Discuss – But the verse doesn't end there. God offers us a gift because he loves us. And this gift is eternal life, and a relationship with God. How does it make you feel that, even though you are guilty of sin and have missed the mark in life, God offers you this gift?

Recall from our last (week's) activity that in order to get to the prize in the middle of our parcel we needed to make a choice to unwrap the gift. It is the same way here. God offers each of us this gift of salvation. He is able to offer us this gift because when Jesus, God's only son, died on the cross, he suffered the death penalty that we deserved, and he did so for everyone! Now, we need to receive the gift of eternal life by believing and trusting in Jesus.

• Have girls turn in their Bibles to Romans 5:8-11 (or have it printed for the girls.)

But God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners. And since we have been made right in God's sight by the blood of Christ, he will certainly save us from God's condemnation. For since our friendship with God was restored by the death of his Son while we were still his enemies, we will certainly be saved through the life of his Son. So now we can rejoice in our wonderful new relationship with God because our Lord Jesus Christ has made us friends of God.

Romans 5:8-11

Discuss – God knew we would never be perfect, so He took care of our sin problem for us. Jesus' death and resurrection are the answer to our sin problem. Now, instead of being God's enemies, we are his friends when we accept God's gift of grace and become followers of Jesus.

Application

DEMONSTRATE GRACE

WHAT YOU NEED:

- Whiteboard, chalkboard or chart paper
- Markers or chalk
- Bibles, or pre-printed Bible verses

WHAT TO DO:

• Read Ephesians 8:8-10 together.

God saved you by his grace when you believed. And you can't take credit for this; it is a gift from God. Salvation is not a reward for the good things we have done, so none of us can boast about it. For we are God's masterpiece. He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things he planned for us long ago.

Romans 6:23

- Review the definition for "grace" from the "Getting Hands-On" section (Grace is receiving a blessing or gift we did not deserve, God's grace is God giving us what we don't deserve.)
- Ask How does it help to know that God wants to do good through you, that he offers you this gift of grace to save you for a purpose?

- As a large group, or in smaller groups, brainstorm ways that we can show grace to those around us. If working in smaller groups, allow time for groups to present their ideas to the larger group.
 - Responses may include:
 - Showing grace with our words (speaking with kind and gentle words even when that person has spoken harshly to you.)
 - Looking for the needs of others (holding a door for someone, helping someone with their schoolwork, even if they have never done anything courteous for you.)
 - Making a financial gift (you worked hard for your money, but you can choose to give it to a worthwhile cause.)
 - Forgiving others (maybe a server spilled water on you, or the fast-food place got your order wrong? Offer grace and forgive them for these mistakes.)
- Hopefully forgiveness has shown up on your list(s). If it hasn't, add it now. Highlight that grace and forgiveness often go hand-in-hand.
 - Read Matthew 18:21-35 to the girls.
 - *Ask* What does it mean to forgive someone? (To cancel a debt, to stop feeling angry or resentful towards someone who has wronged you, regardless of whether they are sorry or not.)
 - Ask How would you feel if you were the first man who was forgiven by the king? (relieved, thankful etc.)
 - Ask How would you feel if you were the fellow servant who was arrested because he couldn't pay his debt? (scared, angry, anxious etc.)
 - *Ask* Do you think the king was justified in his response to hearing how his servant had acted? Why or why not?
 - Ask Do you think Jesus was being literal when he told Peter he needed to forgive 77 times? (No, doubling the number 7 means that Peter must forgive perfectly and infinitely.)
 - Ask How does it make you feel knowing that God will forgive you 77 times?
 - Ask Is there someone you need to forgive? Take a moment just now to think of that person and try to release the feeling of anger and resentment you feel towards them





Prayer:

God, thank you for loving me even though I am not perfect. Thank you for sending your son Jesus to die in my place to cancel the debt of my sin. Help me to show grace to those around me by forgiving those who have wronged me, even when they don't deserve it. Amen

Talk About It

Talk About It makes use of Faith Based Facilitation (FBF), which is a way of helping people think, talk, explore and respond to issues in the light of faith. It results in the development of healthier people and communities who enjoy deeper relationships. Please reference the "Talk About It" section of the Introduction to Grow leader's document prior to starting for an outline on the Faith Based Facilitation model.

RACE

Race is one of the biggest causes of division in our world today. And it doesn't matter whether we are white, black, Indigenous or bi-racial, race – and people's response to it - impacts all of our lives. There is value in exploring race through a Biblical lens to see what God has to say about race to see how we should treat those who are different from us and how we can live in unity.

Discussion Outline

Open with prayer.

STEP 1: WHAT IS THE ISSUE?

- What is meant by race? Can we define it?
 - Dictionary.com defines race as "the major divisions of humankind, having distinct physical characteristics" and "a group or a set of people or things with a common feature or features." Already here, we see words such as "distinct" (different) and "common" (unity).
- Name three realities of race in our world today?
 - Some realities are negative: Racism prejudice or discrimination against someone of a specific race, or different race than the perpetrator, is still prevalent in many parts of our culture.
 - Some realities are positive: Race brings diversity to humanity. We can celebrate this.

STEP 2: DESCRIBE & ANALYZE

- Elaborate on the issues. Invite girls to share personal anecdotes if appropriate.
 - Girls may speak of current events happening in our world that pertain to racism, or they may share their own experiences with racism.

STEP 3: REFLECT & EVALUATE

- What does the Bible say about race? How can Salvation Army doctrine shape our understanding of race?
 - The doctrine of Imago Dei outlines the truth that all humans are created in the image of God, regardless of the colour of their skin or any other physical or emotional differences. – see Genesis 1:27 We are equal in God's eyes, regardless of race.
 - The Salvation Army's 6th doctrine states, "We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ has by His suffering and death made an atonement for the whole world so that whosoever will may be saved." – Our understanding of "whosoever" is inclusive of all races, thus salvation is not racist.
 - Galatians 3:26-28 NLT says, "For you are all children of God through faith in Christ Jesus. And all who have been united with Christ in baptism have put on Christ, like putting on new clothes. There is no longer Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male or female. For you are all one in Christ Jesus.
 - Revelation 5:9-10 shows that people of every tribe and language and people and nation are welcomed into the Kingdom of God.

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STEP FOUR: DECIDE & PLAN - "THEN HOW SHALL WE LIVE?"

- Draw some conclusions together about steps we can take personally and collectively in light of this discussion. How shall we live? Try to decide on two directives and/or goals.
 - Some examples may include:
 - Read books written by people that are a different race than you, to better understand them and to celebrate them.
 - Ask a classmate of a different race to work with you on a team project Speak up against racism when you see it happening.



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Life Skills

WOODWORKING

Basic carpentry skills can not only be good to have for life, but woodworking projects can be an whole lot of fun to create too!

TALK TO A PRO

Ask a carpenter or someone you know with knowledge of woodworking to show the girls three basic woodworking techniques – this might be a great way to get an adult in your Corps to participate in Grow!

- Some basic woodworking elements to choose from are:
 - Swinging a hammer (You could try hammering nails into a piece of wood in the shape of a spiral, star etc.)
 - Using a level (You could have girls practice hanging pieces of paper on the wall with tape using a level to keep them straight)
 - Use a screwdriver (Attach two pieces of wood together using a screwdriver.)
 - Saw some wood (Saw a simple shape like a square, or if your pro is comfortable, girls could try cutting the first letter of their name)
 - Sand some wood (If they have sawed a specific shape, they could sand their creation using a square of sandpaper.)

Please be sure to take all safety precautions possible for these activities. Provide safety goggles for girls to wear and go over safe tool practices with the girls prior to trying any technique.

THRIFT STORE UPCYCLE

If you have access to a community Thrift Store, allow girls to select an old wooden item from the Thrift Store to restore.

- Make any necessary repairs
