ow would you react if someone wrote you a letter that said: "I plan to bless you with resources beyond your imagination and to give you a bright future?" I think I would wonder whether it was some kind of hoax. I might be very suspicious and question how they would accomplish these promises.

But that is exactly what the prophet Jeremiah wrote to the exiles in Babylon – specifically the elders and Jewish community who had been forced to leave Jerusalem and were taken into captivity by the Babylonians. They were refugees, people in a strange land. They were far away from the homes that they knew, and the temple where they worshipped. They were living in extremely difficult circumstances and any hope for the future would have seemed like wishful thinking.

God speaks directly to them in the midst of their difficult situation. He says in Jeremiah 29:11, "'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." He says, 'I know you' and 'I have plans for you and those plans are good.'

The Israelites were in captivity for 70 years. Some of them hearing this message from Jeremiah would never see the hope or future that is promised in this verse.

As Christians today, we can also face many challenges and difficult situations. Jeremiah's words are not a promise to immediately rescue us from hardship or suffering, but rather a promise that God has a plan for our lives and regardless of our current situation, He can work through it to prosper us and give us a hope.




